# Jesus saíd to hím, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." (John 20:29)

We are in a time of transition. As this newsletter arrives we will still have another Sunday in Lent and Holy Week to get through. But we know what comes next, don't we? We know the emotional and spiritual roller-coaster that awaits us as our Lenten candles continue to be extinguished and the tension as Maundy Thursday and Good Friday take away the joy of the triumphal entry on Palm Sunday. We know what comes next, but what about the people who were there that first time?

It is said that on the evening of June 18, 1815 a man stood in the tower of England's Winchester Cathedral gazing anxiously out to sea. After staring intently for who knows how long, he finally found what he was looking for—a ship, signaling news that all of England had been waiting for. He strained to see the message. All of England held its breath with him, wanting to know the outcome of the war between their military leader, the Duke of Wellington, and the French dictator Napoleon Bonaparte. England seemed to stand alone as Napoleon steadily conquered the rest of Europe. Would England be next? The threat consumed them, but now the decisive Battle of Waterloo had been fought.

He stood by to relay the message. What would it be? What was the news that would determine England's future? The signal came just as a heavy fog was rolling in. It only just got through, but he wished it hadn't, for the signal read: "Wellington defeated"

The man signaled to other stations and the news spread across the countryside, bringing great gloom and sadness. But then a great reversal. The fog lifted, and the message was sent again, this time in full: "Wellington defeated the enemy." Wellington had won! An uplifting joy swept through the land with this great news.

We can read this story now with a bit of amusement because we know what happened; we know of the great victory that changed the world that day. But 'knowing' what happened then doesn't lessen the event. The same thing is true of Good Friday and Easter.

On that first Good Friday it seemed the message was "Christ defeated." The people had walked with him as he was beaten, abused, scorned, mocked and finally crucified. It was over. All their hopes had been crushed just as his body seemed to be. Gloom and despair formed a heavy fog that filled their hearts; a fog that hid the full message about what was really happening. But in the clear light of that first Easter, the full message was revealed, "Christ defeated the enemy!" Just as the people of England were overjoyed at the turn of events, so too were those first disciples when the full message of Jesus' victory was fully received.

But how do we look at all this now? We know the story. We've heard it time after time; some of us have heard it enough we could recite it by memory. But does 'knowing' what happened make it any less amazing? I certainly hope not and I truly don't believe that's the case. We know what's going to happen. We know how the events will unfold in the coming weeks; and yet we find ourselves again on that emotional and spiritual roller-coaster. We feel the tension around the table and in the garden; we feel the sting of darkness and the cold of the tomb; and we feel new life that comes from the victory of the resurrection.

Why? Because the greatest story ever told is not one that happened once upon a time; it's not a one-time or even once a year story—it happens each and every day. And the best part is that we are all a part of this truly never ending story. When we sing "Were You There" we can truly say yes, we were. We heard and felt the nails; we felt the cold as the darkness of the tomb wrapped around us; but we were also there to hear the words, "he is risen!"

Blessings on you in this time of transition as we get ready once again to ride that roller-coaster; we may know what's coming, but that makes getting there even better.

As leader of the Ministry Team, I thought I would tell you about the importance of this team. The main missions of this team are Trinity Ladies Fellowship, Social Concerns, In-home Communion and Barton County Association of Churches.

The TLF women meet monthly for Bible Study and fellowship. All women are encouraged to attend. TLF participates in many mission projects. These include supporting Lutheran World Relief with quilts, school bags and health kits; supporting our local food bank with men's and women's hygiene products; sending cards monthly to shut-ins, and those needing healing; visiting and taking gifts to our shut-ins; delivering our weekly altar flowers. They also host a soup fundraiser each year to raise money to support our missions.

The Social Concerns team assists church and community members with financial needs, such as rent, utilities or gas. This team also hosts a fundraiser each year for the Oaks Indian Mission; they support our Barton County Association of Churches by providing volunteers to serve at the food bank one month out of each year; collecting food for the food bank; hosting a Lenten lunch each year and collecting money for Emergency Aid thru the Widow's Mite and Fill the Soup Pot offerings.

The In-home communion team takes communion to our nursing home residents and home-bound members. On average, they serve 20 individuals each month. There is a team of six volunteers who serve communion to those living in Great Bend, Larned and LaCrosse.

Trinity is a member of the Barton County Association of Churches. This organization includes the Food Bank and Emergency Aid. The purpose is to join local churches together to support the needs of our community. Pastor Jay and two representatives attend BCAC meetings six times a year. We share community concerns and strive to spread the word of God thru helping others.

# Council met on March 18 with all members in attendance.

Kristy Jerke reported the education committee has moved forward with children's church starting March 30. The children's service will be during the 10:30 service, during the lessons and sermon. The education committee felt children from ages 3rd grade would benefit the most. It should last about 15-20 minutes and will meet in the parlor.

The Lenten luncheon for our church is scheduled for April 2nd from noon to 1 o'clock. It is a gathering of members from the churches in the community and all are invited. Food and drink are provided.

Confirmation will be April 27 and I believe there will be 2 individuals participating.

Michele Brack has volunteered to begin digitalization of the church's records and the Council has approved the purchase of a scanner, a software package, and a computer. These purchases should be completed in the very near future so Michele with help from volunteers can get started.

Randy Wetzel has provided excellent guidance on our bathroom situation. The plan is to consider automating the entrance door on the family bathroom in the education wing. This would allow individuals to enter or exit with little difficulty (e.g., walker/crutches). Also he is looking into either modifying or changing how the doors on the stalls work so it will be much easier for individuals to enter or exit the stalls. Also the bathroom in the basement (near the stage) will become a family bathroom. Because of the steps it will bot be handicap accessible. The electronic sign on the east side of the church is starting to have malfunctions and a new sign would cost nearly \$40,000 so he is considering modifying and probably going to a non-electric sign. Finally, it was proposed to put leaf guards on our gutters. The gutters on the main structure are too high for the operation steam to easily clean out.

The treasures report was given and no unusual expenses were noted.

Finally, applications for scholarships are available in the back of the church or individuals can apply through Rachel Kitch in the church office. April 15th is the deadline. The endowment committee will meet to determine the recipients.

# **Missions**

BCAC met on March 5th with eight churches represented. It was reported that the Food Bank served 914 people in January and February. Emergency Aid spent \$5,561.59 assisting people with rent, utilities and overnight stays. These totals for the first two month of the year are up significantly over that timeframe in 2024. With the possibility of government cuts for food bank funding, we all may need to increase our donations to the food bank.

There is also a need for churches to host meals for the Thursday night meetings of the Core Community group. These meetings are held at the United Methodist Church to help the enrolled families learn how to budget their money and be better able to financially take care of themselves and their families. There is also a need for volunteers to help with childcare while the parents are in their meetings.

If you have any interest in helping with Core meals or volunteering at the food bank het in touch with Kathy Ahlvers, Ruth Lanterman or Pastor Jay.

As a mission team we continue to look for new opportunities to impact people in our community and across the seas. As we look at the opportunities we have we are also looking to how we can become more involved with the missions we already support. One of these ways is to take a trip to Oaks to see how they have expanded and help them with some much needed projects at their site. We would like to find a Saturday-Sunday that would work to go there and be the hands a feet that they need to get some much needed work done, and to also interact with the children and families they are currently supporting. As we reach out to Dan and the team to find this time, we ask that you pray about this opportunity for all generations of our church to come together and support this mission of Trintiy!


